	To find the topic, ask: Who or What is this paragraph about?	
	☐ <b>Topics</b> can be	
	1.	Single words
	2.	Short phrases
	3.	Proper names
	☐ Topic clues may be:	
	1.	Headings or titles
	2.	Words in <b>bold</b> , <i>italics</i> , or <i>color</i>
	3.	Repeated words and phrases
	4.	Repeated pronouns or other referring words (see p. 212)
II.	The <b>Stated Main Idea</b> consists of	
☐ The topic + the author's single most important point about the topic		
☐ So, to find the stated main idea:		
	1.	Find out the <b>topic</b> (Who or What is this paragraph about?)
	2.	Ask: What's the single most important thing the author wants us to know about this topic?
	3.	Search for the <b>sentence</b> that answers that question.
☐ You know you've <i>correctly identified</i> the <b>Stated Main Idea if the sentence</b> :		
	1.	Contains the <b>topic</b>
	2.	States the single most important point about the topic
	3.	Is <b>general</b> enough to cover all of the info in the paragraph
	4.	Is explained / supported by the other sentences in the paragraph
	5.	Makes complete sense by itself (doesn't really need the rest of the paragraph)
